Our trustee, Pete Hofmann, donated a steam era rail jack which was used by the railroad companies when it became necessary to replace railroad ties. This rail jack could be used to lift the rails and hold them long enough for the old ties to be pulled out and the ties installed. Thanks Pete.

Ruth Michael, our faithful member and volunteer, brought in a dozen large wooden pegs. These were used in the construction of barns to hold the timbers together. This method was used before metal spikes were available. We estimate that these were used for many, many years—probably from early 1800 to approximately 1930. Bring in the youngsters in your family. See if you can convince them that they really did hold up the barn.



Our great supporters and members, John and Linda Bruce, once again sent articles from Linda's ancestors who owned the Newton Mop Factory in Delphos. Wall-[mounted Liberty Dinner Chimes were marketed as luxury items and hung in the Newton home at 328 West Third Street in Delphos. They also contributed a dress that was worn by Mr. Newton as a small child in an era when very little boys also wore dresses. Would the boys in your family believe that boys actually wore such a thing?
