This was the "other" route that was being considered when the Lincoln Highway was first being established in 1913.

## **Elevator**

At long last our elevator is finished! It took 2 state inspections, but it is now fully operational. For our patrons it means access to the basement and 2<sup>nd</sup> floor displays if our stairs are too challenging. For us it means no more lugging heavy objects up and down stairs. Well, most of the time! It's not a very big elevator.

It has been a real odyssey...starting several years ago with putting a door between the 2 buildings on the second floor, then adding a new set of stairs at the front of the building, 2 handicap accessible restrooms, a second set of stairs at the rear of the building and finally, the elevator. In between there was a lot of blood, sweat and tears as displays had to be moved to a new location or stored, messes had to be cleaned up, etc. Through the whole "mess" we remained open and visitors were very understanding of the chaos.

To save money, work was done by trustees and volunteers when possible, but much of it had to be done by contractors. An appreciation luncheon for businesses that helped us complete our many renovations over the past several years was held in June. Attendees



included members of the Arnold Dienstberger Foundation and the Canal Days committee for their generous monetary donations. Grothouse Plumbing and Heating, Furniture. Lehmann's Luersman Brothers Home Improvement, Mark Midwest Geier and Sons. Accessibility, Pohlman Builders. Razinger & Associates Architects, Rural Machine & Iron Works, and Schwinnen Electric. and Wannemacher Masonry. Most of these are local contractors.

### A Look Back by Linda Baker

Although the Delphos Canal Commission has only been around for about 25 years, there are a lot of people who helped pave the way. John Wahmhoff, a druggist in Delphos, began collecting historical artifacts from people in the early 1900's. He soon ran out of storage space and realized it was time to start a museum. He found the space for it in the Public Library basement and formed the first Delphos Historical Society in 1915.

Wahmhoff died in the 1930's, about the same time the library said they needed the basement space for themselves, so the items were stored in various places, suffering from fires, water damage, breakage and pillage every time they had to be moved. In 1974, probably motivated by the country's upcoming bicentennial and by the fact that the public library had built on a new addition and offered what was the old Carnegie Library for a museum, an energetic group formed to reactivate the historical society and the museum. The trustees elected in 1976-77



were Bob Holdgreve, Joan Belt, Jackie Cohen, Gene Williams, Dick Schwinnen, Ray Schuck, Eileen Nichols, Helen Schweiterman, and Ann Schwinnen. Others involved included Donna Holdgreve, Helen Kaverman, Leah Hohenbrink, Marie Myers, Leslie Peltier, Janet Endsley, Marie Grothouse, Mabel Rogers, Polly Conlon, Helen Rozelle, Mel Westrich and Margaret Cauble. Later trustees included Dorotha Peltier, Darlene Kemper, George Bilbrey, Nancy Rose and Ron Leonhart. This historical society museum was very active through the 1980's, but by 1995 Bob Holdgreve was the only original member still active.

Meanwhile, across the canal, a group of boys found the remains of a boat named the Marguerite and a new group formed...The Delphos Canal Commission. In 1992 the Commission purchased its first major property, the old Commercial Bank building, and began setting up displays. Early in 1994 the Delphos Historical Association collections were brought to the Museum Center where they were exhibited along with a reproduction log house and restored 1846 hewn barn. With the move, all of Delphos' rich history could be viewed in a single complex. In 1999 the two groups merged.

It soon became evident that more space was needed and early in 1996 the vacated Sundry Store (the old Grant store) next door was purchased. Within 6 years (2002), thanks to the generous donations of many people, the first floor and basement of this building became crowded and plans began to form for opening the second floor and installing a new elevator in the old shaft that existed.

Today there is a door connecting the two buildings on the second floor, new stairs have been built, and the elevator is up and running. The exhibits have been reorganized with plenty of room for the Marguerite so she can finally have the home she deserves.
